1	Introduction: Kevin Baker, Chair, opened the online meeting (Zoom Webinar) and explained that this was the Annual Members Meeting of the Dublin cycling Campaign and not the AGM of the Company, Dublin Cycling Campaign (CLG)

	<b>Mairéad Forsythe, Chair of the Board,</b> presented an update on governance on behalf of the Board. The Board is reviewing structures and hopes to put forward proposals at the Company AGM in December

I	Proposer: Aodhan King	
	Campaign for Community Based Cycling I move to campaign around promotion of community-based cycling in the greater Dublin area, specifically the urban towns and villages of Dublin. As we experience, and emerge from the Covid pandemic, established working patterns relating to city centre commuting will be altered and reduced. When Covid restrictions ease, 50% occupancy in workplaces is expected in the medium term (6-18 months); with a continuance of this hybrid home/office working expected to extend beyond this period, and becoming an accepted standard norm. Over the pandemic, Dublin inhabitants have become more inclined to cycle close to home. As cycling confidence grows this extends to local requirements such as school, shopping, sports and recreation. Radial cycling connectivity around Dublin is poor and disconnected. Much of the focus in Dublin to date has been promoting main arterial routes such as Bus Connects, Liffey Cycle Route, Sutton to Sandycove. While welcome, these connecting only a few towns and villages of Dublin to their local amenities. Planning, developing and promoting a network of protected and safe cycling infrastructure on a local level is key to creating and maintaining new cyclists; thus creating greater demand for cycling infrastructure citywide. Building grass roots community support for cycling, and its positive attributes, is also key in building support for larger infrastructural projects that are/will be proposed in time.
